Andy Fitzenrider

We caught up with Andrew Fitzenrider of Seattle, Washington, to ask him about his experience using Hamilton Relay.



Why do you use relay service?

I have a speech disorder that causes me to stutter. Sometimes I'll get stuck on a word, and the person on the other end of the telephone will hang up or get confused, thinking the call has dropped or that I am a prank caller.

Which relay service do you use?

I use Speech-to-Speech when I call someone I don't know well or customer service workers who might not know how to react to stuttering.

What do you like about using Speech-to-Speech (STS)?

The Communication Assistant tells my listener that I stutter and that I may need a little extra time to speak. Once my listener is aware, he or she becomes more patient, which makes me more comfortable and more fluent.

Do you have any advice for anyone who may talk with individuals who stutter?

Just be patient and keep the connection going, especially when we are stuttering a lot. I appreciate when people ask me what they should do when I stutter. It makes both of us more comfortable.

What would you like people to know about relay service?

Thank you for this wonderful service. I believe there are many people who can benefit from relay services, and it is our job to reach out to them. Relay providers must continue to provide outreach training and education, building awareness that these services exist.

FEATURED COMMUNITY LEADER:

Dr. Sandra Hobson

Recognized for her long-time commitment to individuals with hearing loss, Dr. Sandra Hobson received the 2017 Better Hearing and Speech Month Recognition Award for the state of lowa. As an audiologist for over 25 years in Des Moines, lowa, Sandra has been an advocate for individuals who are hard of hearing. Her advocacy work includes her role in producing a video to assist local law enforcement in communicating with individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing; sponsoring closed captioning for ABC5 We Are lowa; and volunteering for the lowa Lions Hearing Aid Bank. We recently reached out to Sandra to see what she's up to now!



What is your personal connection to hearing loss?

In third grade, my teacher identified me as having hearing loss, so I was sent to the local ENT (Ear, Nose and Throat Specialist). It wasn't until later that the ENTs and audiologists at the University of lowa concluded that the measles virus I had contracted as a child was the cause of my hearing loss. It took a long time to determine the cause, because I had all of the childhood diseases before I was four years old, and many of those diseases can cause hearing loss.

What would you like people to know about the connection between childhood diseases and hearing loss?

Measles, mumps, rubella and chicken pox can all cause hearing loss—usually from a secondary bacterial infection or fever that could destroy the middle and inner ear structures, causing a temporary or permanent hearing loss. Rubella can be particularly destructive in the first trimester of pregnancy but can cause hearing loss and blindness in all three trimesters. Chicken pox can also cause hearing loss in children, but the virus stays dormant in the body until the immune system is weakened. Shingles or a syndrome called Ramsay-Hunt can occur, which can cause hearing loss when we are older. For those reasons, I strongly support vaccinations to help prevent the after-effects of these viral attacks.

Do you have any advice or additional information you'd like to share with our readers?

- Be willing to contact your local law enforcement precinct and share how they can learn more about working with individuals with hearing loss.
- · Stay up to date on your vaccinations.
- Talk to your audiologist or hearing care provider about the latest technology available.
- Remember the words of Mark Twain: "Kindness is the language the deaf can hear, and the blind can see."

Real Time Text

Many of you have been anticipating the release of Real Time Text (RTT). The good news is that Hamilton Relay is ready to handle RTT calls today! However, not all the networking is in place to deliver RTT calls to relay.

What's next?

We are working with top-tier wireless carriers to help put the necessary network components in place. Today when an RTT message comes through a carrier that is not yet interoperable, we receive the message as a TTY call. As RTT becomes available through relay, we will provide outreach, education and staff training programs to support the service.

RTT Benefits

- RTT can send and receive messages immediately, allowing for faster and smoother communication.
- RTT can transmit and receive text characters in any language.
- RTT texts are silent, so text and voice can be used at the same time.

NANA'S PEA PICKIN' CAKE

CAKE INGREDIENTS

- 1 Duncan Hines yellow butter cake mix
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 4 eggs
- 1 (11 ounce) can mandarin oranges

FROSTING INGREDIENTS

- 1 (8 ounce) container whipped cream
- 1 package vanilla instant pudding mix
- 1 (16 ounce) can crushed pineapple, juice included

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Put cake ingredients into a bowl and mix well. Divide batter into three 8-inch round baking pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.
- 2. Stir together frosting ingredients.
- 3. Cool cake completely before frosting. To assemble, place first layer on a serving platter and spread 1/4 of frosting on the top. Repeat for second layer. Place third layer on top and cover top and sides with remaining frosting.
